Volunteers in Medicine, Wilkes-Barre

Volunteers in Medicine (VIM) is a communitybased full service, free medical and dental clinic. Established in 2008, it is dedicated to serving the uninsured and underinsured people of Luzerne County. VIM has an overwhelmingly positive impact on the health of city residents and surrounding communities.

VIM focuses on providing health services for low-income workers. These individuals and families are financially eligible but have no access to public or private health insurance. Since 2018. VIM has worked closely with the Pennsylvania Vision Foundation to offer its vision benefits program to those in need. Together, we have helped over 290 individuals receive high-quality eye care.

The Foundation values its partnership with VIM and is grateful for our shared commitment in serving Pennsylvanian communities.

The Foundation's benefit program is an incredible resource available to the low income, working uninsured population we serve. As a nonprofit clinic offering free, patient-centered, comprehensive care, it is challenging to ensure that every patient receives preventative care, diagnostic testing, medications and other specialty services. Eye care services would otherwise be unattainable to our clients without this unique collaboration.


